## QUICK REFERENCE GUIDE FOR CORRECTIONS TEMPORARY CONTACTS

## **TEMPORARY CONTACT REQUIREMENTS AND RESTRICTIONS**

You must have one-year continuous sobriety and you are encouraged to have a sponsor. You can only correspond with one inside alcoholic in a DOC facility at a time.

You cannot be taking meetings into a DOC facility.

You cannot be a family member or acquaintance of anyone in a DOC facility or be on a visitors list. You cannot be on parole/probation/supervision. You must be free of court commitments ("off paper") for two years.

## **FACILITY MAIL POLICY**

## Your mail will not be delivered unless it is addressed as follows:

Inside Alcoholic's Name and OID# MCF-facility name Facility Address

# Your first and last name must be included in the return address whether or not your mail address as your return address. A pseudonym cannot be used (like "Bill W.")

- Do not sent stamps, envelopes, writing paper or money.
- Mail that does not comply with DOC mail policy will not be delivered.

## IN WHAT WAY CAN YOU BE OF MAXIMUM SERVICE TO YOUR INSIDE ALCOHOLIC?

- Send your inside alcoholic a letter, sharing experience, strength and hope, as soon as possible. Continue to correspond with your inside alcoholic and as their release date approaches, make arrangements to join them for a meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous within 24 to 48 hours after their release (or as soon after that as possible).
- Encourage them to attend a variety of meetings as often as possible for the first few weeks after their release.
- Introduce them to members of the fellowship.
- Provide them with resources for meetings in your area like paper directories, intergroup numbers and websites and the Meeting Guide App (go to <u>www.aa.org</u> for download information) and a number they can call to talk to an alcoholic 24/7 (if available in your area).
- Show them our literature and explain how it can be obtained.
- Most importantly, help them choose a home group and sponsor or temporary sponsor.
- Your relationship is temporary and you both will decide when it is time for you to move on to help another inside alcoholic.
